## SIH Makes a Difference in Southern Illinois as a Not-for-Profit Hospital System

SIH's mission of service goes beyond doctors' offices and hospitals. We want to make a real difference in the communities we serve. After all, we're talking about our own families and friends. To that end, SIH remains committed to its status as a not-for-profit hospital system.

Simply put, not-for-profit hospitals commit to providing care for all, regardless of a person's ability to pay. In our SIH service area, an average of 16.7% of residents live in poverty, meaning that SIH plays a vitally important role in our region.

Any excess revenues over expenses are reinvested into the organization for operations or are put into the community rather than distributed to shareholders, as happens in the for-profit case. In fact, SIH does not have shareholders. We instead operate under the guidance of a board of directors made up of current and former local community leaders.

Not-for-profits are exempt from most state and federal taxes, but do pay other taxes, such as Social Security and Medicare. To receive this tax status, not-for-profit hospitals must provide specific community benefits as defined by the IRS. These benefits include providing care to those with an inability to pay for services, accepting Medicare/Medicaid, advancing medical training and research, and providing programs that improve community health through education and collaboration with partners. In Fiscal Year 2021, SIH provided \$132.5 million in unreimbursed services to patients with Medicare, Medicaid, or who qualify for our healthcare assistance program. Another \$7.3 million went to programs directly benefitting the region. Not-for-profit hospitals are also required to complete a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and implementation plan every three years.

SIH is proud of what our not-for-profit status means for community members in Southern Illinois, and we are committed to continuing to provide excellent care for all.

### SIH's Mission in Action: Financial Navigators Link Patients to Helpful Resources

The mission statement at SIH is a driver behind the patient care that is provided each day. More than nice words, each department at SIH strives to make this mission relevant to our patients. Whether an employee's work includes direct healthcare or not, all employees at SIH believe that our work contributes to a patient's overall wellness.

This is especially true for the Financial Navigators at the SIH Cancer Institute. Financial Navigators see patients as more than the diagnoses that are written in their patient charts; they are individuals with robust and varied interests, they have families with whom they enjoy special activities, and SIH wants to provide them the chance to feel equipped to manage the complexities of their treatment, especially when it comes to finances.

The office of Financial Navigation helps to eliminate the stress of financial burdens that patients with cancer face and that might typically stop them from wanting to start and/or continue their treatments. Financial Navigators look into MAP (Medication Assistance Programs) to help reduce or eliminate the cost of infusion services and oral chemotherapy treatments. Navigators also assist patients in understanding their current insurance coverages, find assistance for current and on-going medical bills, transportation costs, everyday living costs, medication expenses, finding and enrolling options for additional and/or primary insurance coverage, and more. Each program has different requirements and are all based on income levels, diagnosis, and insurance coverage. Financial Navigators meet with patients to discuss options that work for their lives and empower them to feel in control of their financial needs throughout treatment. The SIH Foundation contributes to the tools that Navigators use by stewarding gifts made to the Coach Kill Cancer Fund to our patients. This important collaboration is one that our patients rely on and that we are proud to provide.
